Technology Tools for Classroom Integration

Wordle : Wordle can be a visual representation of the content of selected text. The graphic will enhance the most common words based on the frequency of usage of a particular word.

Glogster : Students can create Virtual posters called glogs. Glogs can include video, audio, and hyperlinks and shared at home and with their classroom on the web.

Compass : Compass Learning interactively engages students in flash-based learning activities. Compass focuses on Math and Language Arts learning paths that provide feedback and assessment to monitor student's progress and learning gains on targeted objectives.

Twitter : Communicate and join colleagues with 140 characters or less. Create a professional learning community with people who have the same interests in education. Ask me how this or similar tools can also be used in the classroom.

Delicious : Social Bookmarking with Delicious is a site that allows you to tag websites and information that you want to share with students or other colleagues. Keep your favorite website available from any computer with Internet accessibility.
