

Outdoor Heritage Fund Grant Application



The purpose of the North Dakota Outdoor Heritage Fund is to provide funding to state agencies, tribal governments, political subdivisions, and nonprofit organizations, with higher priority given to projects that enhance conservation practices in this state by:

Directive A. Providing access to private and public lands for sportsmen, including projects that create fish and wildlife habitat and provide access for sportsmen;

Directive B. Improving, maintaining and restoring water quality, soil conditions, plant diversity, animal systems and by supporting other practices of stewardship to enhance farming and ranching;

Directive C. Developing, enhancing, conserving and restoring wildlife and fish habitat on private and public lands; and

Directive D. Conserving natural areas and creating other areas for recreation through the establishment and development of parks and other recreation areas.

Exemptions

Outdoor Heritage Fund grants may not be used to finance the following:

- A. Litigation;
- B. Lobbying activities;
- C. Any activity that would interfere, disrupt, or prevent activities associated with surface coal mining operations; sand, gravel, or scoria extraction activities; oil and gas operations; or other energy facility or infrastructure development;
- D. The acquisition of land or to encumber any land for a term longer than twenty years; or
- E. Projects outside this state or projects that are beyond the scope of defined activities that fulfill the purposes of Chapter 54-17.8 of the North Dakota Century Code.

NO CONSIDERATION:

In addition to those specific items in law that are ineligible for funding, in the absence of a finding of exceptional circumstances by the Industrial Commission, the following projects will NOT receive consideration for funding:

- A completed project or project commenced before the grant application is submitted;
- A feasibility or research study;
- Maintenance costs;
- A paving project for a road or parking lot;
- A swimming pool or aquatic park;
- Personal property that is not affixed to the land;
- Playground equipment, except that grant funds may be provided for up to 25% of the cost of the equipment not exceeding \$10,000 per project and all playground equipment grants may not exceed 5% of the total grants per year (see Budget Form for how this will be calculated);
- Staffing or outside consultants except for costs for staffing or an outside consultant to design and implement an approved project based on the documented need of the applicant and the expenditures may not exceed 5% of the grant to a grantee if the grant exceeds \$250,000 and expenditures may not exceed 10% of the grant to a grantee if the grant is \$250,000 or less (see Budget Form for how this will be calculated);

- A building except for a building that is included as part of a comprehensive conservation plan for a new or expanded recreational project (see Budget Form for definition of comprehensive conservation plan and new or expanded recreational project); or
- A project in which the applicant is not directly involved in the execution and completion of the project.

The objective of the McIntosh County Grazinglands Initiative is to provide landowners and operators with an opportunity to conduct conservation planning to address natural resource concerns and provide 60% financial assistance to implement conservation practices which address grazinglands resource needs. The total project cost for the McIntosh County Grazinglands Initiative is \$657,000.00. The project requested \$416,000.00 from the Outdoor Heritage Fund and requires applicants to contribute \$240,000.00.

McIntosh County has lost 10,100 acres of native prairie and cropland conservation since 2010. In addition, 20,321 acres of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) grasslands have been returned to cropland production since 2010. The USDA National Agriculture Statistics Service indicates an increase in all cattle numbers from 42,000 in 2010 to 49,000 in 2015. The conversion of native prairie to cropland and increase in cattle number have made it more imperative than ever to conserve and protect grassland acres and in perfect opportunities to expand conservation on grassland acres. The conversion of 30,420 acres from grassland to cropland has amplified the demand for quality conservation planning on cropland in order to protect soil and water resources. The loss of 30,420 acres, which is the equivalent of 48 square miles, of grassland has dramatically impacted the quality of habitat available to wildlife for cover, food and shelter.

The project is expected to be four years in length, from 2016 to 2019, with an expected positive conservation impact on at least 35,000 acres of grazinglands. The results are tangible and easily qualified by the acres of applied improved conservation on grazingland acres.

The McIntosh County Soil Conservation District (SCD) was organized on November 24th, 1950. The District is a governmental subdivision of state and the public body, corporate, and political representing all land within the boundaries of McIntosh County. The District is governed by a five-member board of supervisors with three elected by the qualified electors of the district. The three elected supervisors appoint an additional two supervisors. The mission of the SCD is to promote wind, soil and water conservation by offering financial, technical, and educational assistance and opportunities to the people of McIntosh County. The McIntosh County SCD hosts field tours, informational assistance and opportunities to the people of McIntosh County. They participate in youth education, outreach and field demonstrations. The SCD has 66 years of experience in developing working relationships with landowners and delivering conservation technical assistance and conservation programs to protect McIntosh County's natural resources.

The primary purpose the McIntosh County Grazinglands Initiative project is to address natural resource conservation needs on grazinglands in McIntosh County. This project is a first for McIntosh County, partnering the Soil Conservation District, Outdoor Heritage Fund funding and voluntary commitment of McIntosh County landowners and producers to address grazingland conservation needs driven by a decrease in native prairie, an increase in conservation of grassland to cropland and declining wildlife habitat. "Grazing land" is a term used by the USDA-NRCS for rangeland, pastureland, grazed forestland, native and naturalized pasture, hayland, and grazed cropland. Although grazing is generally a predominant use on grazinglands, the term is also applied independently of any actual use for grazing.

The availability of grassland acres for livestock grazing production has decreased in McIntosh County by 8,500 acres in the last five years while the number of livestock has increased by 7,000 animals in the same five years. The proposed project will implement practices such as livestock water systems (pipelines, tanks, wells, rural water connections, etc.) grazing land perimeter fencing, cross-fencing, and prescribed or cell grazing to conserve and protect grazing land systems. In addition, the project allows for livestock water systems to expand to cropland in order to provide additional opportunities for native grasslands to have adequate rest and recovery periods. The introductions of rural water systems in McIntosh County and conservation technologies have created opportunities to expand conservation on grassland acres. The project is designed to implement conservation plans to improve grassland health, grazing distribution, increase plant species diversity, promote livestock health, improve the structure and composition of grazing lands, and improve the quality of the products rancher provide to the public.

In the last five years, McIntosh County has converted 30,420 acres of native prairie and Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres into production cropland. The proposed project would encourage and implement practices such as improvements in on-farm nutrient management programs, improve diversity on crop rotation and improved residue management. The project would implement these practice as part of a conservation plan to address soil, wind and water erosion, improve and protect surface and ground water quality, and improve sustainability of cropping systems to simultaneously procedure food for a growing population and improve the soil resource base.

The loss of 30,420 acres of grassland has dramatically impacted the quality of habitat available to wildlife for cover, food and shelter. The proposed project would conserve habitat for upland game birds, song birds, large game animals and pollinator species (including honeybees). The project would encourage the conservation and protection of fish and wildlife resources for future generations of sportsman and wildlife enthusiasts while supporting the economic impacts of hunting and fishing in McIntosh County.

The McIntosh County Grazinglands Initiative will be managed by the McIntosh County Board of Supervisors. The McIntosh County District Staff have working knowledge and experience with administration and technical guidance with District services as well as aiding in NRCS program information.

The SCD Board of Supervisors will establish a Priority Resource Concern Checklist that will aid in identifying local priorities in conservation practice implementation. While establishing priority for funding, the SCD Board of Supervisors will take into consideration the conservation of an entire operational system over a single practice, single field application. All applications will be reviewed and prioritized by the Board of Supervisors using the Checklist prior to applications being approved for funding.

Conservation Plans will be required for each application. The Conservation Plan must incorporate a management and/or monitoring system to ensure continued stewardship for the resource concern identified.

Implementation of the project will begin in the fall of 2016 with promotion, onsite visits and conservation plan development with producers. Agreements would be signed and conservation contracts approved during the winter of 2016 and 2017 for practice installation to begin in 2016 and continue through 2019. This would encompass a four year project duration with acceptance, installation, and monitoring of these projects.

In-kind services used to match the request for Outdoor Heritage Fund dollars shall be valued as follows:

Definitions/Clarifications:

Building - Defined as "A structure with a roof either with walls or without walls and is attached to the ground in a permanent nature."

Comprehensive Conservation Plan - Defined as "A detailed plan that has been formally adopted by the governing board which includes goals and objectives--both short and long term, must show how this building will enhance the overall conservation goals of the project and the protection or preservation of wildlife and fish habitat or natural areas." This does not need to be a complex multi-page document. It could be included as a part of the application or be an attachment.

New and Expanded Recreational Project means that the proposed building cannot be a replacement of a current building. The proposed building must also be related to either a new or expanded recreational project--either an expansion in land or an expansion of an existing building or in the opportunities for recreation at the project site.

Playground equipment calculation - Only the actual costs of the playground equipment (a bid or invoice showing the amount of the equipment costs must be provided) - cannot include freight or installation or surface materials or removal of old equipment, etc.

Staffing/Outside Consultants Costs - If you are requesting OHF funding for staffing or for an outside consultant, you must provide information in your application on the need for OHF funding to cover these costs. For example, if you are an entity that has engineering staff you must explain why you don't have sufficient staff to do the work or if specific expertise is needed or whatever the reason is for your entity to retain an outside consultant. If it is a request for reimbursement for staff time then a written explanation is required in the application of why OHF funding is needed to pay for the costs of that staff member(s)' time. **The budget form must reflect on a separate line item the specific amount that is being requested for staffing and/or the hiring of an outside consultant.** This separate line item will then be used to make the calculation of 5% or 10% as outlined in the law.
