Did You Know?

- Over 3.1 million students took AP Exams in 2025.
- AP is offered in **over 23,000 schools** across the U.S.
- AP helps students earn college credit, stand out in admissions, and save on tuition.

What is an AP Exam?

- Each AP course concludes with an AP Exam.
 - These assessments are designed by the same expert committees that designed the course.
- The exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5 by college and university professors and experienced AP teachers.
 - Many U.S. colleges offer credit for AP Exam scores of 3 or higher.
- AP Exams are administered at authorized schools and test centers. Most high schools that offer AP courses choose to administer AP Exams to their own students as well as external AP students.
- Schools that opt not to administer AP Exams can refer students to another AP testing location.



Let's Talk About AP Exam Scoring

1-5, what does it mean?

We use the steps below to define the knowledge and skills required to earn scores of 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 on an AP Exam.

1

Develop Achievement Levels.

First, committees of college faculty who teach the comparable college course develop detailed descriptions of the performance required to earn each score—these are called achievement level descriptions.

2

Conduct standard-setting studies.

During a standard-setting study, a panel of 15 faculty and teachers reviews the achievement levels and determines how many questions a student would need to answer correctly at each level. These raw scores become the cut scores for each AP Exam score.

3

Conduct college comparability studies.

The same committees administer portions of an AP Exam to students in their related college course; student AP scores are correlated to their final course grades. The results of both studies establish the standards and inform the cut scores for the relevant AP Exam.

How are AP Exams scored?



The multiple-choice sections of AP Exams are scored by computer.



The free-response sections and throughcourse performance assessments, as applicable, are scored by experienced AP teachers and college faculty who have expertise teaching corresponding college courses.



Most are scored at the annual AP Reading, while a small portion is scored online.

- Approximately half of the AP readers are college faculty.
- The chief reader for each exam develops scoring rubrics for free-response questions, oversees dayto-day scoring activities, and selects AP readers and Reading leadership. The chief reader is always a college or university faculty member.



Readers undergo rigorous training to ensure that they have a thorough understanding of the scoring rubrics. Their work is monitored throughout the Reading for fairness and consistency.

How does AP benefit my students?



Build skills and confidence.

- AP students learn essential time management and study skills needed for college and career success.
- They dig deeper into subjects that interest them and learn to tap their creativity and their problem-solving skills to address course challenges.



Stand out to colleges.

- Taking AP courses shows colleges students are serious and ready for academic challenges.^[1]
- 85% of selective colleges and universities report that a student's AP experience favorably impacts admission decisions.



Succeed in college.

- Research shows that students who receive a score of 2 on their AP Exams are ready for college work.^[3]
- Students scoring 3+ often achieve more and graduate at higher rates than non-AP peers.^[4]
- 75% of AP students at 4year colleges start with some AP credit. [5]



Save time and money in college.

- AP students are more likely than their peers to complete a college degree on time,^[6] which means avoiding additional years of tuition.
- Most colleges and universities nationwide offer credit and/or placement for qualifying AP Exam scores.




On **August 1**, AP coordinators and principals receive an email with their school's AP Registration and Ordering access code for the 2025-26 school year.

- The access code is unique to your school. You can't use any other school's access code or share yours.
- The code is specific to this school year. You can't use last year's AP
 Registration and Ordering access code. Schools receive a new code every
 year.
- Your access code is active between August 1, 2025, and July 31, 2026.
- If you're the AP coordinator for multiple schools, you'll get a separate access code for each.




AP Coordinator's Manual, Part 1

Role of the AP Coordinator

As your school's AP Coordinator, you have an important role. You'll manage the exam registration and ordering process; the receipt, storage, distribution, administration, security, and return of AP Exam materials; and the collection of fees and submission of final payment to the AP Program.

AP Coordinator Eligibility

To avoid a conflict of interest, the AP coordinator cannot:

- Be the AP coordinator in the year they're an AP teacher.
- Be employed by a company that provides test preparation services.
- Participate in any coaching activity that addresses the content of secure College Board tests.
- Proctor an AP Exam in a subject area they currently teach or have taught.
- Be the AP coordinator in the year an immediate family or household member may be taking an AP Exam at the school where the coordinator works or at any other school.
- Immediate family includes:
 - Parents.
 - Siblings.
 - Children.
 - Grandparents.
 - Spouse.
 - Applies even if not residing in the same household.

Services for Students with Disabilities (SSD) coordinator

SSD (Services for Students with Disabilities)

To take an AP Exam with accommodations, a student must be approved by the College Board SSD office.

SSD Coordinator

Work with students, parents, and/or counselors to identify students. Collect all the appropriate paperwork.

Use SSD Online to submit a request.
SSD Online is a different system than AP Registration and Ordering.

Submit required documentation by January 16.

Manage and track requests.

AP Coordinator

Communicate with the SSD coordinator on the status of accommodations that impact AP Exams.

Order any required special format exam materials.

Schedule and train proctors to administer exams for students with approved accommodations.

Technology

Most AP Exams require technology during testing.

Technology Coordinator

Assist with technology (Bluebook testing app) required for any in-school, digitally administered AP Exams.

Assist with apps and technology required for World Language and AP Music Theory Exams.

Assist with technology required for AP Chinese and AP Japanese Language and Culture Exams. These exams are only available in digital format.

AP Coordinator

Share all documentation, emails, and access codes with your Technology Coordinator.

Ensure AP students, AP teachers, and proctors are familiar with required apps and technology prior to exam day.

Submit student recordings for scoring through the Digital Audio Submission (DAS) portal.

Leadership

Work with leadership early to set up internal processes and keep communications open.

Principal

Establish policies and set internal deadlines

Determine AP course offerings and help oversee the Course Audit process

Resolve calendar conflicts

Provide access to fee reductions list

Support fee collection and payment

Assist with internal processes for collection and tracking of student payments

Advanced Placement Exam Fees Guidance 2025-2026

For the 2025-2026 Advanced Placement (AP) Exam administration, the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) will use state funds to support the costs of AP Exams in English, math, science, and computer science. Specifically, funds support the following:

- Economically disadvantaged students taking AP Exams in English, math, science, and computer science
 - o For eligibility criteria, visit AP Exam Fee Reductions.
 - NDDPI will cover the entire exam fee for up to four (4) qualifying exams over a student's high school career.
- Other students who take AP Exams in English, math, science, and computer science
 - NDDPI will cover the full fee for a student's first qualifying exam.
 - NDDPI will cover 50% of the exam fees (\$45 of the \$90 fee) for three (3) qualifying exams over a student's high school career.
- · Students taking AP exams in AP Seminar and AP Research
 - NDDPI will cover the exam fee for all students taking these courses (\$53 per exam for economically disadvantaged students; \$99 for other students).
 - Note: These costs reflect the College Board school rebate fee of \$9 and the fee reduction rate for economically disadvantaged students.

Important Exam Fees Information:

The cost per AP Exam and the College Board fee reduction (\$37) have increased. Schools still retain a \$9 rebate per exam.

Exam Fee for on-time exam orders (Order by November 14, 2025, for full-time and first-semester courses. Order by March 13, 2026, for courses that start after November 14)	\$99 per exam
School Rebate	\$9 per exam
College Board fee reduction for eligible students	\$37 per exam
AP Seminar, AP Research	\$99 per exam

The exam cost is invoiced per exam and is the base exam fee (\$99) minus the school rebate (\$9).

• Regular exams: \$99 - \$9 = \$90 (amount due from the school to College Board)

The final invoice reflects the College Board and state fee reductions for eligible students when applicable.

	Exam canceled in AP Registration and Ordering after November 14 and by March 13 (11:59 PM ET). Exams not taken are indicated as unused in AP Registration and Ordering before the school's invoice is generated (invoices are generated after late testing ends).	
Lata Taskina Fan	The original exam fee is removed from the invoice.	
Late Testing Fee	\$40 per exam (in addition to the base exam fee) as applicable for alternate exams for late testing. NOTE: Most reasons for late testing do not incur an additional late testing fee. See page 30 of the AP Coordinator's Manual for late testing reasons with no additional fee.)	

The fees listed above apply to **all** schools. Unused/canceled exams and late-testing fees apply similarly to all students, **including** those eligible for a College Board fee reduction.

Note the following about costs:

- Applicable late orders, unused/canceled exams, and late-testing fees appear in your exam cost (shown in AP Registration and Ordering).
- The late order fee is per exam, not per order.
- College Board fee reductions are available for students in financial need. Many states
 use federal and state funding to reduce the exam fees for these students. However,
 College Board fee reductions do not apply to unused/canceled exams, late orders, or
 late-testina fees.



Digital Exams

The move to digital was positive for students and educators!

- In May 2025, standard paper was be discontinued for 28 exams.
- All schools must administer the 28 AP Exams digitally.
- AP Coordinators and proctors administer digital exams using the Test Day Toolkit (TDTK) web application.

- Students will take digital exams in Bluebook, the same platform used for the SAT Suite of Assessments.
- For math, science, and economics exams that require graphic or symbolic notation, students will view freeresponse questions and prompts in Bluebook and write their answers in paper exam booklets.
- AP Classroom has been updated to have more of a look and feel of Bluebook to help students experience the platform.





Final Ordering Deadline November 14, 2025, 11:59 p.m. ET	Final deadline to submit exam order for all Standard Full Year and Fall Semester Only AP courses, as well as all Exam Only sections, without incurring additional fees. Exams can be ordered or canceled after this date. A fee applies in some cases.
Spring Course Orders and Fall Order Changes Deadline March 13, 2026, 11:59 p.m. ET	Deadline to order all exams for AP courses—such as Spring Semester Only courses—that begin after November 14, and to update fall orders. Late order fees, canceled exam fees, and unused exam fees may apply.









