Welcome – Superintendent Baesler

General Updates – Laurie Matzke

- We appreciate taking the time to be at this meeting and continuing to serve on this committee
- Shauna Greff will email all ppts to the members following the meeting
- State ESSA plan was conditionally approved September 2017
 - Needed to update the Teacher Effectiveness piece
- Final approval January 2019
- USDE Reorganized and has significantly down-sized
- Less oversight however longer wait times for questions to USDE
- Letter from USDE regarding formal ESSA amendments and the process
 - o Minor changes can be done without a full resubmission
 - o No plans currently to file an amended plan with large changes
- CCSSO has been a huge help to states regarding their state plans
 - o Advising to be cautious if changes need to be made
 - o Opening the plan might be troublesome and allow other change requirements
- USDE requires all State ESSA plans to be accessible
 - Working on over the next several months no timeline was given
 - Will send the newly revised accessible plan to all members
- Questions can be asked throughout and don't need to be held until the end of the meeting
- Reviewed objectives of the meeting
 - Updates on ESSA key elements
 - o Input and Feedback on information provided
 - Vote on proposed Choice Ready Formula
 - Two proposed accountability changes
- Nearly every federal program received an increase for 2019-2020
- Key issues upcoming:
 - o Second School Accountability Reports due August/September 2019
 - o Targeted School Support due September 2019

Student Engagement/School Improvement – Joe Kolosky

- Student Engagement survey opened January 14 and is open until February 15
- Approximately 20,000 have taken the survey to date
- Data updated in SLDS every Tuesday
- Common Issues
 - SLDS Access
 - o FERPA training not complete
 - o EProve system creates problems with survey
 - Transfer students

- Updating enrollment in PowerSchool and STARS
- o Broken access codes
- o District enrolled students/Home educated students
- Communication memos sent at least once a week to get most of the schools to administer the survey as it impacts the school's points for accountability
- Once the survey closes, it will not be reopened
- Continuous Improvement Phase II is underway with AdvancED
 - o Tried to expand the number of meetings due to large participation
 - o Anticipate an overflow workshop as most meetings are full or almost full
 - o Reviewed the strategy map
 - Continuous Improvement Plans are due May 1 for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years

Dropout Workgroup – Stan Schauer

- Review the federal and state definitions of a drop-out to see if changes need to be made in the state definition
- Committee has met two times and has been working
- Committee did some "hypothetical forecasting"
- If a student were to leave K-12 and start their GED do we need to mark them as drop-out?
 - o Not if the school district remains responsible for that student
- What is the definition of "Remain responsible"?
 - No clear answer was given from the USDE
 - o This is a good position as a state to take the lead on this and create our own definition
 - o Could include attendance, fiscal, progress, data tracking, etc.
 - o Possible MOU with learning entity and school district so they work together
 - Conflict may arise with regard to who is in charge
 - Could be avoided because it would be a partnership with Adult Ed and K-12
- If this were turned on today what would happen? All NDDPI offices would be affected
- Need to reach out to other states on their definitions (Virginia and Colorado)
- Could have an impact on graduation rates in North Dakota
- Work has been halted because of legislative session but will start back up again
- GED students testing in ND average age is 24
- Timeline is not known and during legislative session, finding time to meet is difficult
- There are a lot of unknowns:
 - o Fiscal note
 - o Century or Administrative Code

Financial Transparency – Adam Tescher

- The problem with most financial displays, they do not get used
 - Confusing
 - o Too much data
 - o Not enough data

- Not transparent
- What will a financial transparency display do?
 - Seek improved equity across districts
 - Seek improved outcomes for the dollar
 - o Improve participation in allocation
 - Drive conversation
- Who is it for?
 - Parents
 - Advocacy
 - Principals
 - Teachers
 - District Leaders
- How will it work?
 - o Chart on the dashboard broken into 6 categories as the cost of education
 - o Is it helpful?
 - Seeking feedback so adjustments can be made to make it beneficial
- School level data has not been collected at this point but will be displayed
 - O What will a parent think of this data?
 - o How will advocacy groups, principals, teachers, view this data?
 - o Will they lobby that district for change?
 - What conversations will this visual facilitate?
- Colorado has a nice comparison display of school financial data
- Schools and districts will be able to dig deeper into each display to see expenditures
- All districts operate differently
- Four things to consider:
 - o Funding language must be straight forward
 - Option to provide feedback
 - Alongside relevant student and school information when possible
 - o Need to keep evolving
- Working on importing of data so schools don't need to enter all information
- Deadline extended for one year so need to have data posted by the end of 2019-2020
- School board association needs to train business managers

Choice Ready – Laurie Matzke/Ross Roemmich/Greg Carlson

- Two changes to the Choice Ready Report chart
 - Two schools moving forward to standards-based grading so added "or"
 - Allow Workforce ready to get credit for using ACT
- Held a Choice Ready workshop with approximately 250 attendees
- No Choice Ready budget:
 - o All presentations were recorded and placed them on the NDDPI website
 - o A O&A was created
 - Choice Ready Guidance was updated

- Need Feedback on:
 - State-Level Baseline Data
 - o Choice Ready Report in Ed portal
 - o Proposed Choice Ready Formula
- Tracy Korsmo provided demonstration of state-level baseline data and Choice Ready Report
 - Data is not for accountability but would be a good indicator if Choice Ready the dashboard contains accountability data
 - o Districts will be able to dive deeper into the data
 - Districts have ability to mass edit
 - Choice Ready guidance is on the homepage
 - o Essential Skills are mandatory fields before any opportunity to be Choice Ready
 - A student can pass 3 pathways however if they have not completed Essential Skills, they will not be Choice Ready
 - o The four-year rolling plan is something that counselors missed
 - o The field needs to be educated on what is required
 - o Transfer students will still be seen but won't be used for accountability
 - o Records are per student, not per district
 - o A comment was made to move the four-year rolling plan into Essential Skills however, until the field becomes more aware, it will be left where it is
 - o A submit button was added and has provided clarity
 - o NDDPI will be able to track who has not submitted so calls can be made to those that have not submitted to inform them
 - Many improvements have been made from feedback received. Feedback needs to continue so more changes can be made to make this effective
 - o Goal is to graduate students Choice Ready which is 21% of accountability
 - o Greg Carlson reviewed/demonstrated proposed Choice Ready Formula
 - ASVAB equivalent to ACT is 31 however, military allows entry if received a lesser score
 - How will this impact the growth formula?
 - This topic will be put on the next Choice Ready subcommittee meeting agenda for dialogue
 - There will always be exceptions to the rule on any pathway
 - o ASVAB can be taken for all students, not just those that are interested in the military as it is a good career building assessment
- Everyone agreed to move forward with the Choice Ready formula as presented

ACT for Accountability – Bonnie Weisz

- NDDPI supplied evidence in support of using ACT for accountability
- 2017-2018, 14 school district juniors used ACT for accountability (which is about half)
- 2018-2019, 33 school districts interested in using ACT for accountability (55.51% participation)
- NDSA ELA/Math results available on the Dashboard
- NDSA Science is being finalized with first assessment Spring 2020 for grade 10

Teacher Effectiveness Reporting – Joe Kolosky

- First round of data reported: 75 Ineffective Teacher Equivalent
- Report is due June 30 through STARS
- We are meeting the requirement within the ESSA plan
- Important to identify which districts are struggling and in which areas so resources can be provided to assist those districts and tailor the PD that would be most beneficial
- New committee formed lead by Rod Jonas to validate data
 - o Examine data
 - o Examine mythology and data collection
 - o Examine usefulness of the data
 - Explore alternatives
- Funds were granted to the REAs to assist and train administrators on using the evaluation tool

Phase III Dashboard Release – Ross Roemmich

- Review and demonstration of Phase III release
- Make sure you have the correct school year data selected

Accountability – Laurie Matzke/Greg Carlson

- Recap of the accountability pie percentages for elementary and high schools
- We are required to annually release school accountability reports
- All reports are available on the dashboard
- First draft will be end of August, early September
- Schools will have three weeks to review data before they are final
- CCSSO has aided states on items
 - o Recommended a theory of action to guide work internally for the NDDPI
 - Asked for six states to pilot an accountability tool, ND has indicated interest
- Greg Carlson reported Phase IV will be ND's first full accountability report under ESSA to include Choice Ready
- Selection for Targeted Support will take place. Some schools may bump out while others may be newly identified (Comprehensive Support is a three-year identification)
- June 30 deadlines for schools to have data entered are extremely important
- No decisions need to be made today however, we need to start thinking about the following: (changes would be implemented at the earliest 2020-2021 school year):
 - When would this committee like to add School Climate to the accountability report?
 - What are thoughts regarding adding the Choice Ready element into the elementary level?
 - Takes some focus off of state assessment for accountability at the elementary
 - Would give elementary credit for initiatives implemented
 - Scientifically proven indicators need to be used
 - Elementary principals might provide pushback elementary principals will be given this idea tomorrow
 - For Middle school, this would be a positive change and not a huge reach

- Need to remember good core instruction at the elementary level does assist in making students Choice Ready
- Purpose at the elementary level is academic in preparation for their future studies and career explorations
- Climate/Culture is an important piece
- Do we want to create a workgroup to discuss this issue?
- Can the next full ESSA committee be solely about Climate/Culture and the elementary pie percentages
