# How Can Our District Use Rural Education Achievement Program Funds?

The Rural Education Achievement Program (REAP) encompasses two grant programs: the Small, Rural School Achievement (SRSA) grant and the Rural and Low-Income School (RLIS) grant. REAP funds (both SRSA and RLIS) can be spent on items that are allowable under Title I-A, Title II-A, Title III, and Title IV-A.

Additionally, SRSA funds can be spent on 21st Century community learning centers and RLIS funds can be spent on parental involvement activities.

# What are Some Examples of Allowable Activities for REAP Funds?

- Career and technical education programs to prepare students for postsecondary education and the workforce.
- Response-to-Intervention strategies for early identification of students with learning or behavioral needs.
- Promoting high quality instruction in science, technology and mathematics subjects, including computer science.
- Carrying out blended learning projects.
- Improving access to arts and music education.
- Providing tutorials and intensified instruction to English learners.
- Providing materials in a language the student understands.
- Providing interpreters and translators.
- Professional development for educators, school leaders, and administrators on the use of technology.
- Laptops, Chromebooks, computer hardware and software for in-classroom instruction.
- Accessible devices and software for students with disabilities.

# SRSA Funds Can Be Used for 21st-Century Community Learning Centers

- Creating academic enrichment learning programs.
- Establishing mentoring programs.
- Providing remedial education activities.
- Providing tutoring services.

### RLIS Funds Can Be Used for Parental Involvement Activities

- Providing materials to help parents improve their child's academic achievement, for example, trainings on school online portals.
- Providing childcare so parents are able to participate in school-related meetings and training sessions.
- Establishing a formal parental advisory council.
