

ESEA-ESSA Nonpublic Equitable Services Affirmation of Consultation

The consultation is an agreement between the district and nonpublic school officials on providing equitable and effective programs for eligible nonpublic school students. Reaching an agreement between the district and nonpublic school officials is grounded in timely, meaningful, and open communication between the district and the nonpublic school officials on key issues relevant to the equitable participation of eligible nonpublic school students, teachers, and other education personnel, and families in ESEA programs.

Meaningful consultation provides sufficient time and an opportunity for all parties to share their views, to have their views considered, and to discuss practical options for ensuring equitable participation of eligible nonpublic school students, teachers, other education personnel, and families. It is in the district's best interest to have a consultation prior to making any decisions that will impact the participation of nonpublic school students and teachers in applicable programs.

A district must consult with appropriate nonpublic school officials during the design and development of the district's Title I program and before the district makes any decision that would affect the opportunities of eligible nonpublic school students to participate (ESEA section 1117(b)(1), (3)). Other topics of consultation must include, as appropriate:

- Administrative costs for providing equitable services,
- Indirect costs,
- Services and activities for teachers and participating private school students,
- Parent and family engagement activities,
- Any funds available for carryover, and
- Transfer or Comingle of Title funds

Note: For every nonpublic school that chooses to participate in an ESEA program, the district must upload a completed and signed *Affirmation of Consultation* form in the Equitable Services section of the Consolidated Application in WebGrants.

If the nonpublic school elects not to participate in any ESEA programs, a completed and signed *Intent to Participate* form must be uploaded in the Equitable Services section of the Consolidated Application in WebGrants.

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires school districts to consult with appropriate private school officials prior to any decision that would affect the opportunities of eligible private school children, teachers, and other educational personnel to participate in federal Title programs. Federal law requires a district to consult with private school officials on the ESEA general and program-specific topics (ESEA section 1117(b)(1); Part F (1) section 8501; 8501(a)(3)(B); 34 C.F.R. § 200.63):

Services offered, including the allowable use of funds under each participating program

Service delivery methods the district will use to provide equitable services to eligible nonpublic school students

How, where, and by whom the services will be provided

When, including the approximate time of day, the services will be provided

Size and scope of equitable services provided to eligible private school students, teachers, and other educational personnel

How and when decisions about the delivery of services will be made

Thorough consideration and analysis of the view of nonpublic school officials regarding third-party contractors and written explanation by the district, if there is disagreement

Whether services will be provided directly by the district or through a separate agency, consortium, entity, or third-party contractor

Whether equitable services will be provided by creating a pool(s) of funds or on a school-by-school basis

Whether to coordinate funds under Title I Part A with eligible funds under other federal programs, including Title II Part A, Title III Part A, Title IV Part A through consolidation. For districts that comingle, their Title II Part A and IV Part A allocations with Title I Part A, the proportionate share will be calculated based on the total of all comingled funds under Title I Part A.
