# TITLE I, PART D definitions to assist with SFN 53733

ABBREVIATION	DESCRIPTION	DEFINITION
ADLTCORR	Adult Correction	An adult correctional institution is 21 and under students who are confined because of a conviction for a criminal offense.
ARC	At-Risk Children	A school-aged individual who:  * is at risk of academic failure,  * has a drug or alcohol problem,  * is pregnant or a parent,  * has come into contact with the juvenile justice system,  * is at least one (1) year behind the expected grade level for their age,  * has limited English proficiency,  * is a gang member,  * has dropped out of school in the past,  * has a high absenteeism rate at school.
CMNTYDAYPRG	Community Day Programs	The definition of a community day program is a regular program of instruction provided by a state agency at a community day school operated specifically for delinquent children and youth.
DCY	Delinquent Children and Youth	Children and youth in a child-caring institution have been adjudicated to being delinquent or in need of supervision.
GRPHOMES	Group Homes	A Group home is a long-term facility where residents are allowed extensive contact with the community, such as attending school or holding a job. It May also Include halfway houses.
JUVDET	Juvenile Detention Centers	A Juvenile Detention Center is a shorter-term institution that provides care to children who require secure custody pending court adjudication, court disposition or execution of a court order, or care to children after commitment.
JUVLNGTMFAC	Long-Term Secure Juvenile Facilities	A Long-Term Secure Facility is a public or private residential facility that provides confinement of the residents and the care of children who have been adjudicated for being delinquent or in need of supervision. Like Juvenile Correctional Facilities.
IDCY	Institution for Delinquent Children and Youth	An institution for delinquent children and youth is determined by the SEA, public, or private residential facility that is operated primarily for the care of children and youth who:  1. Have been adjudicated to being delinquent or in need of supervision; and 2. Have had an average stay of at least 30 days in the institution.
INCY	Institution for Neglected Children and Youth	An institution for neglected children and youth is, as determined by the SEA, a public or private residential facility, other than a foster home, that is operated primarily for the care of children and youth who:  1. Have been committed to the institution or voluntarily placed in the institution under applicable State law, due to abandonment, neglect, or death of their parents or guardians; and  2. Have had an average stay of at least 30 days in the institution.
NCY	Neglected Children and Youth	Children living in a child-care institution need care due to abandonment, neglect, or death of their parents/guardians.
OTHER	Other Programs	Any other facilities or programs not defined above that meet the definition of an institution for delinquent children and youth.
RNCHWLDRNSCMPS	Ranch/Wilderness Camps	A Ranch/Wilderness Camp is a long-term residential facility for people whose behavior does not necessitate the strict confinement of a long-term secure facility allowing greater contact with the community including ranches, forestry camps, wilderness or marine programs, or farms.
RSDNTLTRTMTCTRS	Residential Treatment Centers	A Residential Treatment Center is a facility that focuses on providing individually planned treatment programs for youth (substance abuse, sex offender, mental health, etc.) in conjunction with residential care. The Department notes that it is unlikely that most treatment centers will meet the definition of an institution for delinquent children and youth.
SHELTERS	Shelters	A shelter is a short-term facility that provides temporary care like a detention center but in a physically unrestricted environment. The department notes that it is unlikely that most shelters will meet the definition of an institution for delinquent children and youth.
