Course Description: This course provides context and support for students as they prepare to take on leadership roles within their educational settings. This course juxtaposes competing interests from outside agencies with local voices within particular school systems, provoking students to consider how to balance the array of interests educational leaders regularly face. This course has an application aspect in providing leadership and research opportunities.

Course Goals: The course goals are framed on the MSU Teacher Education Unit (TEU) conceptual model: Teachers as Reflective Decision Makers, which focuses on three components, Action, Reflection, and Knowledge (ARK). The Master of Education degree outcomes are aligned with the core Principles of the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, INTASC Standards, and the ND Standards for Advanced Programs for Teachers. M.Ed. Program Competencies addressed in this course include:

• Participants will expand their understanding of assessment by studying lineages of thought presented in the text and other course materials. They will use that information to prepare academic arguments, participate in dialectic discussions, and create a literature review website, which they will demonstrate an academic argument.

(Knowledge/Reflection)

Participants will consider a variety of arguments concerning assessment throughout the semester. They will participate in blog and video conference mediums to discuss and make meaning from the ideas. (Knowledge/Action/Reflection)

• Participants will create a literature review that develops an argument for one or more research questions. (Knowledge/Action)

Master of Education Program Competencies:

- Candidates will examine use multiple curricular strategies.
- Candidates will critically examine the assessment the employ in the classroom (A critical eye: Examining yourself as a leader.)
- Candidates will explore various assessment frameworks (Critical Discourse: Making meaning through blogs and video)
- Candidates will conduct research concerning modern assessment practices (Mini-Case Study)
- Candidates will develop a research question concerning the topic of leadership (Mini-Case Study).

Time Commitment: Graduate level coursework carries with it an expectation for readings and assignments to take at least two hours outside of class for every hour of class.

When plagiarism occurs, a failing grade will be given for the assignment and future action may be taken according the

Copying material from another student, whether from this semester or a previous one, is unacceptable. If this occurs, both students will receive a zero on the assignment. I am usually unable to distinguish between the person who copied and the person who was copied; therefore, you are strongly advised not to share your work with anyone. If a friend is missing material or doesn't understand something, please advise them to come see me and I will help them. Copying another student's work may have additional consequences, including a referral to Student Life and possible probation at MSU.
