Local, State, and National Educator Shortage

- Currently ND has over 150 job openings in education on <u>www.EdJobsND.com</u>
- All school districts could use additional substitute teachers
- Many positions went unfilled last school year
- All content areas are declared shortage areas for 2022-23 school year

Certification Central <u>www.certificationcentral.education</u>

- ND's 1st Alternative Educator Preparation
 Program
 - Leads to Special Education License if candidate already holds a bachelor's degree (non-education major is fine)

American Board

FRICAN**BÔARD**

- Requires a bachelor's degree in any area, noneducation degree is fine.
- Entirely online and self-paced test preparation
- Pass American Board's two tests one content/one pedagogy
- Apply with ESPB for an Initial American Board License
- Show ESPB your American Board completion certificate and test scores
- American Board License is issued for two years

American Board Content Areas:

- Elementary
- Elementary and SPED (requires a total of 3 tests)
- English
- Math
- Science
- US History

American Board AMERICANBOARD In addition to completing the American Board requirements, applicants must complete the following requirements within the first two years of contracted time in a North Dakota school:

a. American Board's clinical experience program and the North Dakota Teacher Support System (TSS) approved mentor program;

b. Youth Mental Health Competency training;

c. Coursework in cultural diversity which includes Native American studies, as well as teaching diverse learners; and

d. Evidence of competencies in beginning reading instruction

Alternate Access License

Requires a bachelor's degree that is closely related to the content area to be taught (Examples to follow)

Requires a school's request for a person to get an Alternate Access License

School must describe how they have tried to hire a regularly licensed teacher and have been unable to do so

Issued for one year at a time for up to three years – must show progress each year to renew

Normally candidates work with a college to complete the education/content courses and tests needed to meet regular license requirements

Other ND Licensure Routes

Other Routes

- ND Institutions of Higher Education
 - Bachelor and Master Programs
 - Lead to licensure
 - Many offer online options
 - Amount of coursework depends on the coursework previously completed

Teaching Permit (not a license)

- Requires 4,000 hours of relevant work experience in the past 5 years in the area to be taught, or a degree in the area
- Areas excluded: elem, SPED, math, science, social studies, lang arts
- Requested by a district in a shortage area
- Maximum of 3 years, but currently 2022-23 will be the final year, unless something changes with the next legislative session

3 Ways to Qualify for a Substitute Teaching License

All 3 require an application and successful background check with ESPB

Complete the background check – allow 3-4 weeks to process
